WHAT'S NEW AT THE MUSEUM?

We have been fortunate to receive some unique donations these past few months. One recent donation was this nice early school desk from an old school in Richmond. It will be a nice addition to the growing two-seater collection in the Old Port Royal School desks. With a few more we will have nice row for the smaller students. The Locklerr family donated this late 19th-century sofa. It once belonged to the Hicks family who lived at the Peyton-



Brockenbrough House. While we still have some research to do on the piece, we are pleased to add it to the Port Royal Room of the Medical Museum. Another recent addition to

the Medical Museum is this large ironstone bowl. Jerry Dickinson of Essex remembers when Dr. Harris gave the piece to his father, one of Harris's fishing bud-

dies. Jerry thought it should be returned to Port Royal and added to the Museum.



A Little Piece of History

We have recently acquired a collection of Blakemore & Norris Skinning Check tokens. Tokens like these were used at the **Port Royal Tomato Co.**, which operated during the first half of the 20th century on the Port Royal wharf, near where the Water Street fishing pier stands today. The canning business grew out of the steamboat era and provided much needed employment after the Civil War and, later, the Great Depression. It also provided income for Caroline farmers who could bring their tomato crop directly to the factory. The plant was equipped with a coal-fired steam boiler, fueled by coal brought in by steamboats. Many of the packing plants of the Tidewater Region, like Port Royal Canning Co., were built on wharfs or docks, or near the water within easy access of a steamboat landing. During the first half of the 20th century, there were about 40 different tomato canneries just in the Northern Neck area.




From the 1830s to the 1950s, it was common for businesses such as country stores, oyster shucking houses, tomato canning factories, and coal and lumber yards, to 'pay' their workers in tokens. The tokens would be used as tender at the company store or at a local general store in agreement with the company. These Port Royal skinning tokens, however, were likely used to keep track of the work done. At the end of their day, workers would be reimbursed the going amount per token, usually 5 cents per bucket skinned. PEOPLE POSTOFFICES AND COMMUNITIES IN CAROLINE COUNTY, VIRGINIA 1727-1969

This book is full of information about people and places in our county. A called came in recently from someone seeking information on Central Point, VA. This book has 4 pages on the place! I was excited to share it with them. The community named Central Point because a house built there in 1834 was located at a "central point" of the intersection of three main roads leading to three prominent towns. Ralph Fall writes, "R.P Boyd remembered seeing, as a boy, a cedar sign-post marking the distances of either 18 or 20 miles from that point to Bowling Green, Tappahannock or Walkerton-it truly was a central point!" In 1872 Rev. Spencer Todd and Rev. H.L. Young, with the assistance of Rev. Andrew Broaddus of Salem Baptist in Sparta, established St. Stephen's Baptist Church at the crossroads. In 1924 the church structure was said to be the "largest and most costly house of worship...in Caroline County."

HISTORIC SITES TOUR ON U.S. ARMY GARRISON FORT A.P. HILL Sunday October 30th 2:00pm to 4:00pm

Fort A.P. Hill will host members and guests of the Caroline County Historical Society and Historic Port Royal, Inc., for a tour of historic sites on the installation. The event will start at 2:00pm at Mica School (Heth). It is about a 10 to 15min drive at from the North (Main) Gate to Mica, so give yourself plenty of time to make the 7-mile journey. After a welcome from LTC Duffy and Environmental Division staff at the old school (built 1929), installation staff will guide guests over to the antebellum Liberty Church (c. 1850), then on to The Lodge (c. 1938) overlooking Travis Lake. The last stop will be Baylortown, where Cultural Resources staff will share what has been learned during their field research.



From Mica, Fort A.P. Hill staff will guide guest to all other destinations. While on the installation, guests *must* stay with the tour group until the end of the event. Guests are asked to *not* take any photos on the installation until such time as when the guides offer photo opportunities.

Restroom facilities and water will be available at Mica and The Lodge. Light refreshments will be served at The Lodge. The <u>Wealthy In Heart</u> Oral History book, about life in Caroline County in the 1930s, will be available to those who wish to have a copy. An itinerary full of information on the sites will be provided to guests, as well.

For entry onto the installation, all guests will need to show their driver's license, or state-issued identification card. Garrison Security will need the full names of all guests by COB Thursday, Oct 13th, 2022.


